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Missouri River Regional Trails Plan

Work to Date—Guiding Principles

- Trails will highlight the wide variety of recreational and interpretive
 experiences offered by the region. All possible trail uses, including walkers,
 runners, bikes, snow trails, water trails, ATV, horse riders, and mountain
 bikers will be included.
- This plan will concentrate on the opportunities offered by recreational trails as a way to improve the quality of life for local residents and the economic benefits of attracting visitors to the region.
- Trail design policies will be based upon known trail designs that make trails accessible, sustainable, attractive and safe.
- Optimally, trailheads should start in communities or parks. Users will need gas, food, gifts, and services while traveling; we want to make it easy for visitors to spend money.
- Design trails for year-round use.
- Integrate trails that minimize impact on the natural environment and existing infrastructure.
- Establish a common theme and logo for all public trails in the Missouri River Region; including private trails.
- Maps will show all the trails with their locations and amenities, as well as the various ecological, cultural, and historical points of interest.
- Create connections and alternative trail routes to minimize trail users sharing a road with motor vehicles. Utilize 'minimal maintenance' roads for alternative routes. Employ traffic signs warning of trail use along heavily traveled roads.

The Missouri River Regional Trails Plans are now underway. We welcome everyone interested in trails to attend.
